Only two months into being Mayor, I was asked by Brading Youth Club to open their Christmas Fair which was a great success with £1000 being raised. I then went over to look at the Christmas tree festival at St Mary's Church. This gets better every year with more and more trees being displayed.

We have managed to keep the precept very low this year for the 7th Year. We understand the hardship that everyone is going through, what with the high price of food, gas and electricity but I think this may be the last year that we can keep the precept to a minimum.

Brading Town Council have awarded 3 grants this year to support Brading Community Partnership, Brading Methodist Church and Gift to Nature.

Our Allotments continue to be in demand and we are always looking to see how we can make improvements for out tenants. This year we replaced the rotten gates, extended the water supply and had the dead trees cut down. We have further works planned for the year ahead.

We continue to support the Foodbank with a monthly donation of £50 along with generous donations from the public. This enables us to provide a well stocked cupboard for those who are in need of a little extra support. We are always pleased to welcome new faces as well as those who have used the Foodbank before.

Brading Town Council are still in negotiation with Brading Town Trust in acquiring the New Town Hall for our offices.

We are looking to get some more volunteers for the station before we open the first weekend in April. You do not need to know anything about trains. Can you make a cup of tea? Plant some of the planters on the platform? Would you like to know a bit more about Brading station and help in the heritage room? Or just come down for a cup of tea and cake. All are welcome.

BRADING PRECEPT 2023-24

The precept is the Town Council's share of the council tax which is collected by IOW Council. The Town Council does not receive any direct funding from central government and relies on its Precept plus any other income it generates from services or facilities it provides.

Brading Town Council has increased the Precept by 0.9%. This means the cost to a Band D taxpayer is 1p per week.

We are all aware of the difficulties experienced during the financial crisis that is upon us and anything we can do to ease the financial burden on Ratepayers in Brading has been a priority for Councillors.



WARD COUNCILLOR UPDATE

At this time of year Councils, whether they be local Town and Parish Councils or bigger Local Authorities, like the Isle of Wight Council, adopt an almost tunnel vision stance as they look at their budgets and decide a new one for the coming financial year.

It wasn't always like this. It used to be a case of identifying what you needed to spend on running the Council day to day, thinking of some projects you would

like to do, putting a cost on them and adding it all up. Now the task is very different. At the Isle of Wight Council it has become a matter of survival. Even leaving aside the failure of Government to give us our proper share of funds as an Island, thirteen years of austerity and restrictions on Council Tax levels have left us in a state where we can only afford essentials and we can't fund many of them properly. Very little in the budget is about choice. It's about scraping together something that works and is legal, which is far from easy.

In recent years we have also seen a political mantra in many quarters stating that Council Tax increases must be avoided at all costs (pardon the pun!). However, if you think about it, that is ridiculous. Can you spend the same on your food shopping bill each year and still expect to get the same for the same money? Or better? Money decreases in value each year, so if you have the same amount or you artificially restrict how much more might be available you hit a problem. In the home you end up eating less, as a Council you end up able to do less.

The Isle of Wight Council will have set its Budget by the time you read this. There will have been a decision to increase Council Tax by 5% and no one will be happy, but hopefully something that enables essential functions to be maintained will have been passed.

In the local Towns and Parishes there is no restriction upon how much the local element of your Council Tax, known as the precept, can be raised. What is done tends to depend on whether pragmatism or politics wins out. Many Towns and Parishes are increasing their precepts this year. In Brading we are doing so at a minimal level, being conscious of the bigger picture, in particular the 'cost of living crisis' that affects us all, but also being able to benefit from the careful financial management of the Town Council by the staff over the years.

This means Brading can both benefit from a minimal rise in the local precept but also continue to benefit from all aspects of the work the Town Council undertakes. It also enables the project to take on the ownership and management of the New Town Hall to proceed. There has been some misinformation spread about this project but it is a positive move to give the Town Council a better long term home while also enabling a valuable Town resource to be maintained and supported for the benefit of all. I am very supportive of the plan.



Captain John Thorp (born 1817)

Captain Thorp only lived in Brading for about a decade, but he left a very significant and lasting legacy. Having served in the army in the 63rd Regiment, he retired to Brading in the 1870s. He lived with his wife Anne Dorothy at the newly built St Wilfrid's in New Road.



In 1879, Mr Munns, a Brading farmer, struck a buried mosaic floor while making holes on his land for a sheep pen. Captain Thorp, who was in the area looking for Roman antiquities, helped Mr Munns uncover the Gallus panel the next day. By spring 1880, all of the site on Mr Munns' land had been excavated, which was half the villa; the remainder lay in the Oglander estate. Excavations were able to continue when Lady Louisa Oglander purchased the other half of the site. In his notebook and in later interviews, John Thorp was adamant that he was the 'discoverer of the Villa'.

John Thorp meticulously recorded his excavations, tools, thoughts and findings in his notebook.

He recorded "On 22 March 1880 I exposed to view a fine specimen of a Roman pavement, which occurence soon got wind of in the neighbourhood, and was quickly followed by a motley crew of men, women and children doing much mischief in picking out Roman tesserae in all directions, those ignorant creatures supposing there must be a great treasure of money buried on the spot!"

Fresh or cut flowers should be placed directly on the grave. We ask that they should be removed from any plastic wrapping, bows or temporary containers.

Items strictly prohibited unless on a new grave when items may be permitted for a period of up to 13 months.

Kerbs and Chippings, Railings, Ornaments, Lights, Photographs,
Ceramic Portraits, Children's Toys, Models,
Garden Ornaments, Artificial Flowers (this applies to flowers made from plastic, silk or any other material), Windmills, Balloons,
Wind Chimes and other trinkets.

All the above items will be removed from the grave tops and disposed of twice yearly from the graveyard.

The dates when this will happen are the last day of February and the last day of August each year.







Operation Mile: Policing teams pursue new initiative to tackle road-related offences



Policing teams on the Isle of Wight are embarking on a new co-ordinated initiative to keep the Island's roads safer.

Operation Mile will see Neighbourhood teams (NPT) and Response & Patrol (R&P) teams across the Island each given an individual stretch of road where there will be additional dedicated patrol activity and enforcement work.

The allocation of roads will be intelligence-led, looking at data surrounding our hotspot areas for serious collisions and dangerous driving behaviours, and utilising the ever important infor-

mation provided to us by the public.

Inspector Matt Gooding said: "We know how much of a concern driving standards on the Island are to the public. Isle of Wight police receive lots of calls and reports relating to road matters, which range from our most serious 'Fatal Four' driving behaviours – drink and drug driving, driving without a seatbelt, driving whilst using a mobile phone, and speeding – to anti-social issues such as vehicle noise and nuisance. This is in addition to our response to collisions on our roads.

"We have recently brought on board our two new dedicated Roads Policing officers, who are already doing a fantastic job alongside their dual skilled armed response and roads policing (RP/ARV) colleagues to proactively take action against road users who pose a risk behind the wheel.

"Incorporating teams such as NPT and R&P into the roads policing picture allows us to improve our effectiveness at targeting bad drivers, whilst having a greater visible presence in problem areas to deter motorists from continuing their bad habits whilst driving.

"It's important for the public to understand that whilst NPT and R&P will be providing support to our roads policing priorities, this does not mean that they will be neglecting their other workloads or response to other crime types. These teams still have very important roles in working alongside our communities to address crime trends, and also to respond to emergency calls. That will not change and will not be impacted by this new initiative.

"What will happen is that officers will spend more time out in hotspot areas whilst they continue to manage their other priorities. For example, if an officer is required to conduct some administrative work after responding to a call for service, they will be expected to do this remotely whilst parked up in a hotspot area as opposed to returning to the office. This will allow them to maintain a longer presence out on the road, and thus deter or respond to any road-related crimes in that area.

"With more teams putting greater focus on our roads it also enables us to get a much fuller picture of which areas are impacted by bad driving. There is often a perception in the community of which areas are the worst impacted, but our intelligence gathering and patrol activity will provide us with a much more accurate understanding.

"It's so important that the public continue to report their concerns to us and any crimes they have witnessed."

Lewis Campbell, Road Safety Officer for Isle of Wight Council, said "Having additional officers involved with important Roads Policing activity means a wider coverage of traffic-related enforcement activity across the Island. Not only does this act as a deterrent, the initiative brings a renewed awareness for road users that poor driving standards can have serious consequences for themselves and their communities.

We're grateful for our police colleagues efforts and welcome the additional enforcement which, alongside our awareness campaigns such as Project Pictogram, helps to save lives."
