MAYORS ANNUAL REPORT

Brading Town Council has had a very busy year.

A restructure of council staff took place in September with the following moves: Sue as qualified Town Clerk, Linda to Responsible Financial Officer and Emma as Admin Officer.

The Brading Centre continues to provide assistance to residents with queries both for the Town Council, the IW Council, Island Roads etc.

A public meeting was held with representatives from Wightfibre, answering resident's concerns regarding their works on the main road.

There are monthly surgeries for our Ward Councillor, Jonathan Bacon and the Police Beat surgery held on 2nd Tuesday of the month.

The Outreach Post Office opens every Thursday at the Brading Centre from 9.30-11.30 We also offer an economical photocopying/printing service.

Brading Town Council has responsibility for maintaining the public spaces and gardens throughout the town: the Memorial Garden, Parsonage Garden, Tudor Garden, Community Garden, the seat at the junction of Wrax Road and the Greenwood Lane Garden at Morton.

We also maintain The Butterfly Walk and the Children's Play area at Beechgrove and part of the park. We had the equipment repaired in the playground.

The Council managed to obtain a £5000 grant to help support the foodbank and payment of utility bills. The foodbank is available, should the need arise, for anyone that needs support. Donations are also received from the Town Council, Churches and residents.

The Council awarded grants last year to Brading Community Partnership, Gift to Nature, The Methodist Church and the Horticultural Society.

The Allotments continue to be in demand. Last year the rotten wooden gates were replaced, an extension to the water supply was fitted and the dead elm trees were cut down.

Two litter picking days were held which were well attended by local volunteers and Army Cadet Force members.

The Station Heritage Centre was opened and run by our volunteers.

Local organisations worked together with the Town Council to arrange a Celebration Day for the Queen's Platinum Jubilee at Brading Football Club ground. There were also formal tree planting and beacon lighting ceremonies.

Many people think Brading is just a 'drive-through' town but they would be very surprised at the amount of work that goes into maintaining Brading's thriving community.

A special thank you goes to all of our wonderful volunteers.

There are so many tremendous things that go on!

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WARD COUNCILLOR UPDATE

For this issue of the Buzz it has been suggested that I provide the text of the Annual Report I gave to the Annual Meeting of the Town Council, so here is what I said!



The last twelve months have been eventful. Aside from national politics, which I will not talk about

here, we have seen a Platinum Jubilee, a Royal Funeral and, in the last few weeks, the coronation of a new Monarch. Brading has played its part in all those events. It is a strong and active community and such events bring that to the fore.

In Brading I am privileged to be both a member of the Town Council and your Ward Councillor and, as such, your political representative on the Isle of Wight Council. I hope that I use this latter position both to support residents and also to support the Town Council and the work it does for the Town and everyone within it.

At County Hall I am a member of the Cabinet and have responsibility for Climate Change, Environment and , following some recent changes, also Financial Strategy. The majority of my time over the last year has been directed towards work to get principles and strategies to support our Climate Change Strategy and to further the 17 Sustainable Goals of the UNESCO Biosphere embedded within the way the Council works and within the way it develops policies and makes decisions.

A lot of discussion has gone into the development of the new Island Planning Strategy in the last year. This has been something that has been in development since 2018 and, unfortunately, it has been delayed for various reasons. In a way the delays within the Council have now been overtaken by the fact that the Government announced changes to the Planning System earlier this year. The first of these changes were supposed to be put in place in 'spring' (to use the Government's word). We are still waiting. Unfortunately the view is that we cannot take the Island Planning Strategy forward until we know what these changes are. As such things are on hold.

On the plus side the delay has also meant we can work on putting more policies into the plan to support the environment as well as measures to deal with surface water, tree planting and moving towards better use of energy and so on. One particular measure that is coming forward is a Local Nature Recovery Strategy. This will do what it says on the tin. It is a national idea but, if all goes well, the Island could be the first part of the Country to bring such a strategy forward.

Closer to home in Brading, a lot has been happening over the year but, on the whole it has been a matter of 'Taking Care of Business' The team in the Brading Centre are excellent. I attend the Centre for a Surgery each month and it is a good opportunity to catch up and see the hard work that goes on.

A measure of the fact that things are going well, oddly, is the fact that we see few people at Town Council Meetings. Over 15 years experience of a number of Parish and Town Councils has told me that any meeting where a lot of people suddenly turn up out of the blue means something is going wrong!

We perhaps saw that with the announcement of extensive Wight Fibre works in Brading at the end of last year. There were a lot of concerns and the meeting in advance of the works was VERY well attended. However, I think it fair to say that, while there was disruption, it was kept to the minimum possible in the circumstances and that the teams on the ground were generally responsive to local needs. As ward Councillor very few issues came my way once the work commenced. I think all those that did were resolved.

Flooding is always a concern. We have particular issues in Brading and we have tried to get Southern Water to provide support through their projects to deal with surface water issues. Unfortunately, if that's not the wrong word, it seems that Brading's issues are not as severe as other areas so we are not at the top of their list, however I will keep the pressure up.


Much work in the Town has gone towards responding to the cost of living crisis, including maintaining the food bank in the Brading Centre. I think it's fair to say that things were not as bad as anticipated but the Town Council were prepared for all eventualities.

Lastly, a major project that is underway is of course the proposed move of the Town Council to the Town Hall. I have sought to help on the Working Party and have been able to assist in negotiating an extension to the lease at no cost in order to give time for the details of the move to be sorted out. That was my report.

I must add here that it was fascinating and enlightening to hear the other reports given at the Annual Meeting. We sometimes forget just how much and how many good things happen in the Town.

For my part, I try and do all I can in my Councillor roles to support things. If you have any issues please feel free to contact me at any time. I will always respond to messages. You can also speak to me at my surgeries at the Brading Centre, the next few of which will take place on the following dates: June 6th, July 4th, August 1st and September 12th. All sessions start at 10am. **Regards**


Improved Access at Brading Down Local Nature Reserve

Funding from the Isle of Wight Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty's Access Fund has enabled local charity Gift to Nature improve access for disabled visitors to Brading Down Local Nature Reserve.

Gift to Nature has been working with Isle Access to improve accessibility across their portfolio of 31 sites. Brading Down was identified as a place where access could be improved. However, the scheduled monument status of most of the car park, and lack of funding, had prevented making any changes.

Fortunately, the western most car park (Newport end) lies outside the designated area and so the Gift to Nature rangers have installed a gate wide enough to accommodate wheelchair, pushchair and mobility vehicle access. In addition, seating has been built which permits anyone, regardless of their level of mobility, to sit and chat or share a picnic.

Graham Biss, Managing Director of Natural Enterprise said, "One of our key aims is to make our sites more accessible to everyone and we hope these improvements will benefit all. Brading Down offers a spectacular view of the surrounding area. We are very grateful to the Isle of Wight AONB for their support"


Copies of the book are available from the Old Town Hall for £15.

Operation Wightwash

Enforcement operation tackles driving offences on the Isle of Wight

In April, officers from the mainland-based Roads Policing Unit joined Isle of Wight colleagues for a two-day enforcement operation on the Island's Roads to tackle poor driving standards and drug/drink drivers who put road users at serious risk of coming to harm.

The operation has been stood up in recent years to bolster efforts in intercepting drivers committing offences on Isle of Wight roads, and is run at regular intervals throughout the year. Over three years, increasing results from the teams have been seen and this operation will continue to be a regular occurrence.

Across the two days, officers identified 179 road-related offences. Six of these resulted in drivers being arrested on suspicion of drug driving. A further 12 motorists had their vehicles seized for lack of insurance and tax.

161 drivers were given a fixed penalty notice or reported for offences including speeding, driving without a seatbelt, using a mobile phone behind the wheel, driving without due care and attention, driving without a licence, driving with insecure loads, driving with tinted windows or visors, and driving with number plates that did not conform to legal requirements.

The teams were encouraged to see that vehicles that had been stopped in the past for number plate issues were observed with legal plates, and lots of flatbed vehicles with netting to secure their loads, which suggests that previous work, education and engagement with drivers is having the desired effect.

Members of the public are encouraged to report driving offences, and concerns around driving standards to police so they can identify any hotspots and take action to keep road users safer.

To make a report to police, call 101, or submit information via the report tool on the Hampshire Constabulary website. Always dial 999 in the event of an emergency.


The choir are going from strength to strength, with Rookley. many new members joining after Christmas, bringing the number of regular singers close to 40.

The Haven Churches Providing a spiritual harbour for ALL The new Haven Churches Benefice is born



St Mary's Parochial Church Council (The PCC) has been working hard not only to pick up the pieces after the pandemic but also maintaining the running of the church after Rev Alison's departure.

The PCC meet monthly to enable the church to run as smoothly as possible without a vicar, along with quarterly benefice PCC meetings to maintain the links with the other churches in the benefice.

Unfortunately, we are still only having Eucharist on the 1st and 3rd Sundays of the month, conducted by our associated priest Rev Barry Downer. Other services are conducted by our lay reader, Sylvia Beardsmore and we also have a trainee Deaconess in the benefice, Charlotte.

We received communication from the Bishop of Portsmouth before Christmas giving us notice of Suspension. This is a notification that stops any patron, of any particular church, appointing a vicar (an ancient right of a patron when there is no incumbent). The patron of St Mary's is Trinity College Cambridge who last sent a Dean down to speak and preach to us about 20 years ago, the suspension can last up to 5 years.

In modern times it is used as time of review for the diocese, to look into the structure of the Benefice, but we at St Mary's, and the three other churches in the benefice have written to the Arch Deacon of the Isle of Wight stating that we do not want to be split up, or be part of a bigger benefice.

This may affect the appointment of a replacement vicar.

Two members of the congregation recently completed a Lay Worship Leaders course, they cannot give communion, but can prepare and lead a Sunday service. We are hoping to have a Service of the Word on the Sundays when Rev Barry is not available.

The Church Hall is now back to being a community resource, and pre pandemic groups have started to return to using the hall, along with St Mary's social activities in the hall of jumble sales, coffee morning and concerts.

Our wonderful team of volunteers and bakers work very hard indeed to make sure there is always a great supply of home made cakes to supplement their very popular bacon baps and there is always a warm welcome for everyone who comes along.

The Youth Club has been as busy as usual. We held a Barn Dance BBQ in March, which was a lovely evening and really enjoyed by all. We also took a group of 17 young people of varying ages across to the mainland to Southampton University's Science Fair. It was a great day out and a fantastic opportunity for all those who decided to attend and benefit from the learning experiences on offer.





In April, we started Non-Contact Boxing sessions at the BYCC on Tuesday evenings. This is a boxing activity which does not involve direct body contact with punches. It is a nationally recognised sporting activity which can be progressed in the same way that Judo can progress through varying levels. Interest in this has

been steady but there are still a few places left for any young person who would like to attend and increase their physical fitness.
